Fort McMurray

The wildfires in northeastern Alberta have disrupted the lives of many people - not just the evacuees. All the volunteers and donors, both individual and corporate that stepped up to help the evacuees are to be congratulated. Whether they are Lions or not makes no difference. As the evacuees begin to return home, they will begin to assess what Fort McMurray needs, and within a few weeks or months we will be albe to start planning how Lions can help make things better. LCIF has provided a grant of USD 100,000, to be managed by a committee headed by incoming MD C Council Chair Tim Haight. The Lions of Alberta Foundation has also received about \$200,000 in donations intended for Fort McMurray so far.

Any Clubs that aided the evacuees and spent money on emergency relief supplies (recalling that eligible supplies are for immediate assistance only, and is extremely limited as to what the money can be spent on) can apply to have that money refunded. Submit your requests for reimbursement to Tim Haight: cst.tim@mvpinc.ca or at 147 Rocky Ridge Bay NW Calgary T3G 4E7.

The above mentioned committee will include incoming District C-1 Governor Ron Wackenhut and incoming District C-2 Governor Gail Haight, PID Jack Isaman, plus other Lions as selected by the committee. The committee meets online this coming weekend.

To the Fort McMurray Lions we say: get home safely, do what you need to do, and give some thought as to how the relief funds we will have available can serve your community. Also consider that any of us in the wider Lions family are prepared to help with any physical, emotional or organizational assistance any of us can provide. We will be in touch in the coming weeks.

Other charitable groups do not seem to be this poorly rewarded for their efforts, and this is not the first time that Lions' involvement in signifgicant projects have been minimized.

Year End Reporting

Not only does the District directory depend on the accuracy of this information, the events in Fort McMurray proved how critical accurate information is. We can understand why Fort Mc-Murray Lions were hard to find, but trying to communicate with Lions around the area was made difficult and sometimes impossible due to the lack of accurate contact information for Club officers.

You need to report even if there are no changes to your Club executive. In July, LCI purges this year's records, and officers must be reentered, or the positions will appear unoccupied. Accurate phone numbers and email addresses are criti-

Clubs also need to pay their invoices from LCI and the District in a timely manner. Failure to do so can and will lead to financial suspension, with cancellation of a Club's charter if payment is more than 150 days past due.

The Man behind the Red Vest

Lionism is based on loyalty and tireless dedication and Morinville Lions Club President Francis Fryters has done just that. Fryters said he was sponsored to be a club member by Charter member Peter (Pete) Gibeault in 1984. Before Gibeault passed in 2003 he made Fryters promise to keep the Lions club going. He said ok I will try.

As the Morinville Lions Club celebrates its 67th anniversary of receiving their charter on 6 June 1949 Fryters celebrates having served for 32 of those years and continues to serve with the Club. Fryters has received numerous Lions ? Club International (LCI) and Multiple E District Awards; the LCI Foundation 5 Honour Roll, Melvin Jones Fellowship, 5 Judge Brian Stevenson Fellowship, 5 100% President Award, Dr. Jack Dobush 5 (Diabetes research) Award and the Bill to Webber fellowship Award. He received the Morinville Citizen of the Year Award in 2013.

He has held numerous positions $\check{\Phi}$ including Vests, Mints, meat draw, € Peace Poster, Project Pride, can tabs, a eye glass collection, and President in 1989-90, 1996-97, 2006 to 2010, and 2014 to the present.


For the welfare of the community the S Lions had two projects which need mention said Fryters. One is the Heritage place, six self-contained units for seniors, built at a cost of \$155,473 in 1979. The other, the Morinville Lions Manor, which contains eight one-bedroom units, cost \$378,295 which was officially opened in 1983. Although both projects were financed by the Alberta Housing Corporation, both the residences were managed and maintained by members of the Morinville Lions Club. Fryters was Chairperson on the Board of Management for the Lions Manor and Board member of the 6-plex by Heritage Lodge that Lions managed and offered alternate housing for seniors. The Lions built the patio at the back of the Manor.

Fryters remembers when the Lions Club of Morinville was one of the driving forces behind the Morinville ambulance. In 1983/84 Lion President Ron Hansel and the club got a commitment from the town to buy a replacement ambulance if its members raised enough funds for the first ambulance. The club raised \$12,500 in six weeks by canvassing every resident and farm house in Morinville and vicinity. The funds were raised

by holding such functions as a street dance and a slave auction. Fyters said they also donated over 50 teddy bears to the RCMP and ambulance.

Since then the club has donated special breathing equipment and sight testing machinery which was donated to the Sturgeon Health Unit in conjunction with the Legal Lions.

Fryters said he was a two year member when he got involved in the Blood Donor Clinic. "It was different from now. We put the name on, did registration, set the time clock, and did everything, now nurses do it." At the time they also had a kid's corner with coloring sheets to keep

Fryters said the Lions had a float during the Frontier Daze and he was the Frontier Daze parade organizer for three years.

The Teen Centre building came from the old town hall when it was broken down and the Lions could have it but had no place for it. At first it was moved to the man-made lake at a cost of \$1500. It was moved back to town for the same cost and with an additional \$4000, cost to fix it and add power it was placed in its current location at Lions Park for the teens to use.

When the Lions celebrated their 50th anniversary in 1999 the Cavalcade for Diabetes was center stage and first time it was in Morinville. Fryters said the first roast was for Pete Gibeault and held at the Frontiersman Restaurant upstairs and the second roast was in celebration of the clubs' 65 th anniversary and featured Ron Cust.

Fryters said he organized the first Lions Club Golf tournament nine years ago and it is ongoing to this day with the next tournament to be held 20 August.

For the future Fryters said the Lions need new members and new ideas. The current need is for everyone to work together with Midstream and other organizations to find it a home. It is a work in progress.

Francis Fryters was born November 1941 in Zundert Holland to Jos and Marie Fryters. He had four sisters and one brother. In August 1967 he ventured on his own and came to Canada to settle in PEI. Fryters said he came to Canada because he wanted something else.

MD C HALL OF FAME NOMINATION AND DISTRICT C-I AWARDS

The District C-I Awards Chairman is requesting nominations for the following awards. The deadline for nominations is September 30, 2016

DISTRICT C-I YOUTH ACTIVITIES AWARD

The District Governor will make the decision on the club that will be presented with the award based on the following criteria. To be eligible for this award, the Club must have completed at least six of the following in the Lionistic Year:

- 1. Participated in Lions Youth Exchange through their club members personally hosting a youth exchange student.
- 2. Provided a financial contribution to the District C-I Youth Exchange Program or to the MD C Youth Exchange Program.
- 3. Sponsored youth(s) to travel on the Lions Youth Exchange or to attend a Lions Youth Camp.
- 4. Participated in or financially supported Lions Quest.
- 5. Participated in or financially supported at least two local youth organizations such as Scouts, Girl Guides, minor hockey, minor ball or other organized and recognized nonprofit youth groups.
- 6. Provided financial support to the District C-I and Sri Lanka Foster Child Program.
- 7. Made a financial contribution to Camp He Ho Ha ..
- 8. Sponsored a new Leo Club in their community.
- 9. Provided funds to purchase equipment for children with special medical needs or for children who are blind or deaf.
- 10. Participated in the Lions Clubs International Peace Poster Contest.
- 11. Participated in and/or financially supported Project Pride.

A letter of nomination must be received by the District Awards Chairperson no later than September 30, 2016

Hall of Fame is a Multiple District award, nominations must be sent to the District for a vote at the district convention.

Any Lion, Lioness, Lions Club, Lioness Club, or Zone may nominate a candidate from District C-I to the Multiple District C Hall of Fame.

- 1. There is no nomination fee.
- 2. There may be a maximum of one (I) candidate per district, inducted into the Hall of Farne each year.

- 3. The Awards Chairman must receive nominations at least 30 days prior to the District's Annual Convention. Each individual District will hold an election to determine the successful candidate.
- 4. The award may be presented to either a Lion or Lioness and only one recipient per District may be elected annually.
- 5. The award may be presented posthumously.
- 6. Each candidate must have 15 years of service and be two years removed from Council (if they have served as a member of the Council of Governors).
- 7. Each candidate should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavours. He/she should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community.
- 8. All sponsors will use the standard form, No other will be accepted.
- 9. The sponsors will ensure the candidate, or representative, will be in attendance at the Multiple District Convention.
- 10. All successful candidates will be inducted to the Hall of Fame at the next MD C convention.
- 11. A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to the delegates attending the annual MD C convention, and published in the subsequent MD C newsletter.

The application for this award may be found on the MD C website.

The application must be received by the DISTRICT A WARDS CHAIRPERSON no later than September 30, 2016.

DR. LYNN G. HALL LEADERSHIP AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING LEADERSHIP IN LIONISM

This Award was established in 1997 in recognition of the outstanding Leadership qualities in Lionism displayed by the late Lion Dr. Lynn G. Hall. Lion Lynn was a member of various clubs for over 50 years, serving two terms as District Governor: 1952-53 and 1976-77. Always quick to step forward, no matter what the project, Lion Lynn was a leader by example. He exemplified what Lionism is all about. His professional life included teaching and school administration as well as serving as the Mayor of Lac La Biche and Councilor of Wainwright.

AWARDS CRITERIA

- 1. A Lion Member in good standing with a Lions Club for a MINIMUM OF TEN YEARS.
- 2. A Lion who has demonstrated continuous leadership for a MINIMUM OF THREE YEARS.
- 3. A Lion whose leadership may be at the community, club, district or International level or a combination thereof.

APPLICATION CRITERIA

- 1. Application may be made by any Lion in good standing within District C-1
- 2. The nomination to be in the form of a letter which includes the following:
 - Name of Award applied for
 - Name of the nominated Lion
 - Name of that Lions Club
 - When the Lion became a member
 - Their commitment to Lions
 - Biography of Nominee
