I know clubs in Calgary are already involved with that city's goal of planting 50,000 trees this year. Thank you to all the clubs that have taken up the Centennial Tree Planting challenge, fulfilling one of our Global Pillars of Service.

Has your club accepted the "Million Meal Challenge" issued by Lions Clubs International as part of the upcoming 2021 International Convention? The St. Albert Host Lions and St. Albert Breakfast Lions Club have. They partnered with other community organizations and had food collection points in several different locations manned by volunteers. End result was \$6000 in cash donations and 6000 lbs of food collected for the food bank! What an awesome show of Service! I can't forget the Bearspaw Lions Club who too, partnered with the Cochrane Activettes Food Bank for their annual food bank drive. 14 club members were tasked with canvasing an area of Cochrane, picking up food donations from the porches or front steps of residents. The result of this partnership was the most successful food drive in the history of the event, filling 15+ three cubic meter bins. Thank you Bearspaw Lions Club for engaging with your community and supporting

another Pillar of Global Service, hunger. If your club is interested in taking part in this challenge as well, I had previously sent out all the details to club Presidents, Secretaries, Service Chairs and Zone Chairs. #### REDWATER LIONS CLUB.



# LIONS ARE Stepping UP at NORWOOD

South Edmonton Lions through their WE SERVE FOUNDATION has made a donation of \$50,000.00 to the "CapitalCare Foundation Norwood Capital Campaign" specifically for the "Gene Zwozdesky Centre" which is currently under construction on the Norwood site. We consider this to be a "Legacy Project" for our Foundation because it fits the objectives and purpose for which it was created over twenty years ago.

The CapitalCare Foundation believes this Centre is important enough for future senior care in Alberta that they created a "Norwood Capital Campaign Cabinet" to raise over \$6 million to outfit the new Centre with the equipment and programming resources it requires.

To encourage large donations, the Campaign Cabinet has approved "naming opportunities" for spaces within the new Centre, starting at \$50,000.00, with other suggestions at the \$100,000.00 level. The WE SERVE FOUNDATION of the South Edmonton Lions is guaranteed to have its name and the LION logo prominently displayed in a space of our selection; however the "WE SERVE" executive were urged to make contact with other Lions clubs and individual Lions, to ask them to add to our "down payment", thereby getting the Lions logo, and donor club names. in a more prominent location.

This notice in Lions Link is to alert you to this opportunity; the contact with the Norwood Capital Campaign is Barbara Noble, the Campaign Coordinator, Tel. 780 999 9817, email at <a href="mailto:Barbara.Noble@capitalcare.net">Barbara.Noble@capitalcare.net</a>. Her work with us is called the "Lions Pledge Campaign" [ "Pledge" because many clubs may have to spread their donation over several "Lionistic years", ditto individuals].

Barb has two 'docs' to send out, one with more information about "naming opportunities", the other is about the "Innovative Seniors Care" that will be available at the Gene Zwozdesky Centre. She also has the Pledge forms for clubs to fill out, and a form for individual donors, identical to the form used by CapitalCare Foundation, except for Lion membership/club name – to add donation to Club Pledge.

Naming this new centre for the late Gene Zwozdesky honours a long serving elected provincial official but also a mainstay of Ukrainian culture in Canada. Thanks largely to him, Lions clubs had the privilege of being entertained by the "Shumka Dancers" at many of our Charter Nights and Conventions.

Many of us living in the northern part of Alberta have been "guests" at Norwood, or one or more of the other 9 CapitalCare centres; all of us will have had relatives, neighbors, fellow workers and club members to visit. What a pleasure it will be to have such a visit to the Gene Zwozdesky Centre in 2023/2024, and proudly point out the Lions logo, your club name and the importance of that donation to the outfitting.

- Challenge all Lions in your club or district to add one green habit to their daily lives.

- Recognize a local organization or community leader for environmental conservation work.
- Volunteer with your local park service to maintain. trails. Help more people access and enjoy nature!
- 27. Commit to "Meatless Mondays" or not eating meat one day each week.
- 28. Collect used cellphones and donate them to individuals in need.
- Lead an after-school nature walk.
- Survey homies and community areas for leaks in. sinks, communal spigots or water fountains. Contact relevant officials for repairs.
- 31. Work with city officials to paint "no dumping" signs near road drainage areas.
- 32. Identify where to recycle toxic items and share the collection schedule.
- Organize a mural competition to promote environmental awareness. Paint the mural in a prominent community location.
- 34. Implement a recycling drive where people donate gently-used items to charity organizations.
- 35. Develop a demonstration garden or landscaping plot using native plant species to restore the habitat and conserve water.
- 36. Sponsor a training program for farmers on how to make and use organic fertilizers and pesticides.
- 37. Produce a monthly nature program on a local public radio station.
- 38. Partner with a local carpenter to build rain barrels. Hold a training session with community members to promote using them for watering and irrigation.
- Organize an alternative transportation incentive. program to encourage walking, biking, public transportation and carpooling.
- 40. Establish a school garden and composting program to improve school meals & reduce waste.

- 41. Volunteer to deliver prepared meals to those who are elderly or visually impaired.
- 42. Organize a program at a local school to provide healthy, nutritious meals.
- Prepare food baskets for families in need.
- 44. Volunteer at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- 45. Take families in need shopping for fruits and vegetables.
- 46. Organize an event to benefit a food bank in your community, use cans of food as admission.
- 47. Hold a hunger walk and use proceeds to buy food for a children's center or a homeless shelter.

- Create healthy snack packages to be distributed to children in need.
- Partner with local restaurants or food markets to deliver donations to a shelter.
- Start a food co-operative to serve as a resource for healthy food at a more affordable price.
- Collect infant formula and baby food for an organization serving young mothers at risk.
- Work with healthcare professionals to provide free classes on nutrition & food preparation.
- Provide fruits and vegetables as a healthy snack for children in childcare facilities.
- Provide transportation for those who are elderly or visually impaired so they can shop for food.
- Teach children to bake a loaf of bread they can take home to their family.
- Invite a local food bank representative to speak at a club or district meeting.
- Provide needy children with backpacks supplied with food for when school is not in session.
- 59. Host a picnic or BBQ at a park for the community.
- Establish a community vegetable garden where local residents can growtheir own food.

# Vision

- Organize a braille, large print and audio book collection to benefit a library or senior center.
- Volunteer to create audio recordings of books & periodicals.
- Work with local eye care professionals to provide community vision screenings.
- 64. Sponsor a World Sight Day event.
- Sponsor visually impaired students through camps, contests or other activities.
- Create a community arts program for children and adults who are blind or visually impaired.
- Collaborate with an eye bank to promote the importance of corneal donations.
- Develop a directory of community resources and services for those who are visually impaired.

- Organize an inclusive sporting event for children with and without visual impairment.

- Remodel a children's cancer center.
- Form a support group for those affected by childhood cancer.
