

a vehicle lease. The
donation covers \$650. for
a one-month lease plus

detailing and maintenance.

SVS would use the vehicle to transport Hope, the Court Support Dog, to court appearances, hospital visits and Zebra Unit interviews, and for use by the staff attending crisis call-outs. Llons Club Treasurer Deborah Robillard presented the cheque to Craig Klettke of Jiffy Lube Morinville. Klettke had circulated a letter to business and non-profit groups and said their goal is to hand SVS eighty cheques at once.

Aluminum Can Tab Collection Program

In the last two weeks over 446lbs of tabs were delivered to the Lions Internationals District C1 Zone Chairs' storage facility. For decades the Lions Cl;ub of Morinville has been involved in collecting aluminum pop tabs year round. The



current recipient of the funds generated from the recycling of these tabs is the Stollery Children's Hospital for diabetic supplies.

Only the tabs are collected instead of the whole can. The tabs are more easily recycled and easier to store in collection containers. They are also easier for the Lions Club members to handle when recycling large volumes. Continued next page

The Llons Club picked up used glasses from Amy Maxwell at the Morinville Library. They are one of the drop-off points for recycled eyeglasses.




Cantabs, glasses and

REDWATER LIONS CLUB TOGETHER LOCAL LIONS SUPPORT HEALTH CENTRE AUXILIARY

Each Club donated \$1,000.00 to top up a memorial donation received by the Auxiliary to purchase a new ice machine. Combined with the memorial donation the Health Centre Auxiliary received a total of \$6,000.00 that will pay for the majority of the commercial machine that has now been ordered.

The project started pre-COVID when the Thorhild Club inquired about purchasing a machine to replace the aging unit at the Health Centre as it had stopped working. When Diane Pysmeny recently secured funds in memory of her late husband Ron for the same purpose the clubs decided to match the funds Pysmeny had raised and therefore take some of the financial burden off of the Auxiliary members. The clubs advised that this was their first opportunity in recent memory to combine service for all the residents of the Redwater, Radway and Thorhild areas so it was an easy decision to make.

WHITE CANE History

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible.

In 1930, Lion George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts.

Also in 1931, in France, Guilly d'Herbemont recognized the danger to blind people in traffic and launched a national "white stick movement" for blind people. She donated 5,000 white canes to people in Paris.

Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and in a few other countries, providing persons who are blind a legal status in traffic. The white cane universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind. For specific information contact your local government office for motor vehicles.

Lions & International White Cane Safety Day

International White Cane Safety Day is an opportunity to increase awareness about the white cane, which:

- Signifies that the pedestrian using it is blind or visually impaired;
- Alerts motorists of the need to exercise special caution and provide the user the right of way;
- Symbolizes the independence, confidence and skills of the person who is using it.

1964: the U.S. Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the US to annually issue a proclamation designating October 15^{th*} as "National White Cane Safety Day."

1969: the International Federation of the Blind adopted October 15^{th*} as "International White Cane Safety Day."

* The above referenced date is a suggested date. Lions clubs are free to hold awareness events according to the schedule of the club and the community it serves.

Purpose of the Advanced Lions Leadership Institute (ALLI)

The purpose of the Advanced Lions Leadership Institute is to provide Lions leaders with an opportunity to enhance skills in preparation for leadership responsibilities at the zone, region and district levels.

Participant Qualifications

- 1. Applicants must be Lions that have completed a successful term as club president but have not yet attained the position of first vice district governor. Lions members who are currently serving as club presidents will be considered on a space-available basis.
- 2. Applicants must be willing to commit to attending all days of the institute, including group mealtimes, and understand that personal time is extremely limited. **Attendance at all classroom sessions and scheduled meals is mandatory**.
- 3. Applicants must be capable of understanding and participating in the language of instruction at this institute.

Cost of the Institute

Lions Clubs International will provide meals and lodging according to the schedule of the institute. Please note a non-refundable fee of **US\$125.00** is required for participation in this training event. This fee will be due no less than six weeks prior to the institute start date. Please do not send fees until you receive a letter of acceptance to the institute. Participants are also responsible for their own transportation and related travel expenses to and from the institute site.

Selection Process

Because of the high number of applications received by the association, acceptance into the institute is <u>not guaranteed</u>. <u>All applicants will be notified of selection status no more than three weeks after the application due date *via the email address provided on the application form*.</u>

The Leadership Development Division of Lions Clubs International reserves the right to cancel any institute or language-specific classroom due to insufficient applications submitted by the stated application due date.

Expectations of ALLI graduates

- 1. Pursue additional leadership roles and responsibilities in their respective zones, regions, and districts.
- 2. Help to develop Lions leaders and serve as a leadership resource in their respective clubs, zones, and districts.
- 3. Share their institute experiences with members of their zone and district and encourage other qualified Lions to apply to the institutes.

Application Procedure

Submit the completed application form by **December 26, 2021** in order to be considered.

Email completed form to <u>institutes@lionsclubs.org</u>. Upon submission of the application, senders will receive an automatic reply to serve as a receipt of the application. If no reply is received, check spam/junk folders and resubmit as needed. If email submission is not an option, submit via fax to 630-468-6740.
