The conflict in Ukraine is posing substantial challenges to the Ukrainian people and our Ukrainian Lions clubs. Lions stand for peace and understanding, and we unite through kindness to serve our communities and people in need.

Lions International is in contact with our Ukrainian clubs to determine how to best support them and the humanitarian crisis that is unfolding there. Here are some of the steps we're taking:

- LCIF support Lions Clubs International Foundation is encouraging donations to the
 new Refugees and Displaced Persons fund. Contributions to this fund will help ensure
 that Lions are there to help families find the safety and security they desperately need. LCIF is
 also in the process of awarding grants to help provide immediate relief in the area. A grant has
 been approved for Poland, and we expect to award additional grants to other countries
 receiving Ukrainian refugees.
- **Social media** We are sharing messages of peace and encouraging LCIF donations on our LCI and LCIF social media channels.
- <u>lionsclubs.org</u> home page We are developing a homepage banner for both LCI and LCIF homepages to promote LCIF donations for refugees and displaced persons.
- Responding to questions If you receive questions about Ukraine, we encourage you to
 direct inquiries to our Public Relations team at PR@lionsclubs.org.

We will continue to monitor the situation and evaluate other steps and communication needs in this rapidly changing environment.

DUES ADJUSTMENT RESOLUTION

To be voted on at 2022 International Convention

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

CLERC 4th Quarter Report.

Like all of us Covid has had a negative effect on CLERC activities. This quarter CLERC hosted 4 eyeglass work parties. A small group of volunteers continues to process glasses every Wednesday. We have cancelled many volunteer sessions for Lions Clubs. Hopefully conditions will improve and we can continue on with Lions Clubs volunteering virtually every second Saturday once Covid starts to ease off. Financially we have received donations from 14 District C-2 Clubs, from one Lions Club from Saskatchewan and 5 from District C-1 clubs or individuals.

186,350 pairs of glasses were shipped to Ghana, Sierra Leone, Ivory Coast, Guatemala, Malawi, Mexico, Cuba, Philippines and the Ukraine.


Recently we did a huge warehouse clean up and reorganization to facilitate more storage space, better product access, and a more efficient process. The Calgary correction Centre is back up and running after being shut down for covid reasons and safety concerns. That is a big help in aiding the process and bumping up the numbers for our inventory moving forward. We recently shipped 26 pallets

of broken glasses to Respecs in California and will receive a cheque in 6+ months if we are lucky.

The CLERC executive would like to thank all clubs donating to our eyesight initiative. We always require contributions to offset operating costs. CLERC will have representation at the C-1 convention, will be doing a live presentation and will be bringing 2 trucks up for transporting eyeglasses from District C-1 to the warehouse.

Lions across Alberta unite to celebrate 70 years of service

Club transforms kindness into action

The St. Albert Host Lions Club does a heck of a lot more than cook pancakes on a griddle.

It rallies to provide disaster relief sup-port, blood donor clinics, refugee spon-sorship, and legacy scholarships for high school students, just to name a few pro-jects. But that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Throughout its existence, the local chapter has supported projects related to vision, the environment, childhood can-cer, hunger, diabetes, and other pressing humanitarian needs across the nation and the

This weekend, the Lions Club celebrates its 70th Charter Anniversary Banquet on Friday, March 4, followed by the District C-1 convention on Saturday, March 5, at St. Albert Inn. The district convention promises to attract province-wide delegates from Red Deer north to Yellowknife.

The Friday festivities launch with cock-tails and dinner, entertainment from hypnotist Wayne Lee and country music entertainer Zach Willier, and Judge Brian Stevenson of Calgary as the keynote speaker.

A Lion since 1966, Stevenson is also a multiple-award-winner who served as president of the International Association of Lions Club and as its Good Will Ambassador.

"He will be speaking about commit-ment to service. He's a long-time friend, a good speaker, and a good enter-tainer, as well as providing meaningful insights," said Bill Webber, 88. The senior Lion joined in 1964 and served as past president in 1967-68 and 1980-81.

At the Saturday district convention, the keynote speaker will be Dr. Louis Hugo Francescutti, a major driver of the Bridge Healing Program. Based on the Tiny Villages project, this novel approach would combat homelessness using hos-pital emergency departments as a gateway to temporary housing.

The Edmonton pilot project's estimated costs are \$1.5 million, which includes the construction of two buildings for the homeless, said Webber.

"The district would supply kitchen equipment and furnishings. We're look-ing to fundraise \$150,000," Webber said. "It's a fascinating program. The convention is an opportunity to inform the district what is being planned and encourage them to contribute."

This is not the first major project where Lions have put kindness into action. The club is perhaps best known for Lions Park, a much-attended, multi-generational recreational park on Sir Winston Churchill Avenue in St. Albert.

"It was one of the first things in the service club I was involved in. We spent many weekends in the park. It was pri-marily in the 70s we did the grunt work. It's been an extremely well-used park. It doesn't matter when you go, families are always there," Webber said

Another long-standing signature pro-ject is support for the 533 Air Cadets — 100 young people who meet once a week at St. Albert Community Hall. The club provides financing to assist cadets taking various programs, includ-ing marksmanship, music in marching band, and flying courses.

"The big attraction, of course, is get-ting a glider's licence. Once you have a glider's licence you can get up to a powered licence."

One of the club's most recent projects was pitching in to sort supplies and clothing donated to the Citadel Fire dis-aster relief.

"Citadel received an amazing response in donated clothing, but they had diffi-culty sorting and distributing. Our mem-bers assisted with that," said Webber.

Whether it's planting fruit trees at Lacombe Park Community Gardens, fundraising for seeing-eye dogs, or donat-ing to the St. Albert Food Bank, the St. Albert Host Lions Club is always ready to contribute.

Bridge Healing addresses the inequitable challenges facing the most vulnerable members of our communities. Today, individuals experiencing homelessness are currently being released from emergency departments with no permanent home to go to. The Bridge Healing Program seeks to not only obtain food and housing, but also to connect these people with a variety of health and social services.

A key partner of Bridge Healing is Jasper Place Wellness Centre (JPWC), an Edmonton based non-profit community development organization. For the past 14 years, the work JPWC has accomplished in the community has been ground-breaking. From being the first agency to implement Housing First (1,100+ previously homeless individuals housed) in a quick, less costly, and effective manner, to running an employment program (\$1M of payroll goes back into the community annually), to operating a primary care health clinic and hosting food security programs across Edmonton.

Through Bridge Healing, homeless individuals discharged from the emergency department will be transported to one of JPWC's two Bridge Healing buildings consisting of 12 units each and immediately housed in one of these small units. At JPWC, residents will be provided with wraparound services that they require immediately and in the long term, to address their needs. The ultimate goal is to have Bridge Healing facilities across Edmonton providing services addressing complex social, health and mental needs for these individuals. Bridge Healing is scalable and transferable to other communities across the province and the country.

The donations from the Lions Clubs and the grant that we receive from LCIF will be used to purchase kitchen equipment and dining room furniture in JPWC's 2 buildings. These rooms will bear Lions signages and logos. Lions will be able to host events in the dining room and common areas with topics such as financial literacy training, nutritious food preparation and other life skills.

The Lions Clubs have a long history of serving food and helping the vulnerable segments of our community. By supporting Bridge Healing, Lions clubs in District C-1 will be able to provide even more services to the vulnerable members in our community.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Education/experience should have past experience as a professional and responsible nature in business administration, public relations, and management.
- Abilities/knowledge considerable knowledge of the organization structure, policies, activities, and programs of Lions Clubs International as well as that of MD C
- Ability to plan, lay out, and direct the administrative services as they relate to MD C
- Ability to communicate effectively orally and in writing
- Ability to motivate; and
- Ability to develop and maintain effective working relationship.
- Ability to provide office space, internet and telephone as required to carry out the duties of the MDC Secretary as well as the use of in-house equipment and supplies; including but not limited to computer, printers, shredder, office supplies (pens, paper, stapler, envelopes, stamps etc.)

Duties Under the supervision and direction of the council

a) Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all meetings of the council and shall within (30) days after each meeting forward copies of the minutes of the same to all members of the council.

- (b) Assist the council in conducting the business of the multiple district and shall perform such duties as are specified or implied in this Constitution and Bylaws, or as may be assigned to him/her from time to time by the council.
- (c) The council secretary shall have a criminal check done by a police agency in his/her area each year or as required, with said report to be kept on file at multiple district office, the cost of the criminal check shall be an administrative expense of the multiple district.

Start Date: July 1, 2022

Renumeration – direction of Council – Semi-annual Honorarium and approved expenses

FUNCTION

The primary purpose of the Secretary is to direct and coordinate the administrative services at the Multiple District level by carrying out directives as issued by the Council and performing such other functions as required by both the Multiple District Constitution and By-Laws and the MDC Policy Manual.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Carry out all assignments under the direction of the Council as are required in the performance of duties that pertain to such office.

Carry out the efficient administration of MDC Headquarters, including:

- i. Employment and supervision of secretarial personnel.
- ii. Location and organization of suitable accommodations of all MDC merchandise.
- iii. Keeping of all necessary records, minutes, etc.; and
- iv. Complete responsibilities for ordering and keeping accurate inventory of merchandise where applicable.

Schedule and program Council meetings in cooperation with the Host District Governor. Assist the Council in the organization and administration of MDC Conventions and meetings.

In cooperation with the Council Chairperson, plan and prepare the agenda for Council meetings.

The agenda should be in the hands of the Council of Governors no less than 10 days prior to the scheduled Council meeting

In cooperation with the Vice Council Chairperson, plan and prepare the agenda for Finance meetings. The agenda should be in the hands of the Council of Governors no less than 10 days prior to the scheduled Finance meeting

Record and distribute, within thirty (30) days of the conclusion of the meeting, to the Council Chairperson, the District Governors, the Vice District Governors and/or District Governors Elect, and the Council Advisors (on request) minutes of all Council meetings, and record minutes of the MDC Convention business proceedings.

Maintain in an up-to-date fashion the MDC Constitution, By-Laws, and Policy Manual. Annotate amendments and arrange for reprinting of such documents or chapters as required

Under the direction of the Council, work with standing committees as a source of information.

Reports when received from Committee Chairpersons, should be available to District Officers. In this regard, maintain records indicating progress of programs and arrange that such information be given to District Officers

Work closely, as an advisor, with each District Governor when requested, as a consultant on matters dealing with public relations and publicity, fund-raising, program and promotional planning, protocol, etc. Work as the liaison between Lions International and the Lions of MDC.

Maintain and make available to all Governors and recognized committees and projects an up-to-date mailing list service. It includes all Club presidents, secretaries (by District), all Past District Governors, and all Multiple District Committee Chairpersons in MDC.

Purchase and sell certain parts of the official MDC convention dress uniform and accessories when directed by Council. This shall include carrying an inventory and keeping proper records of the vendors.

The MDC Secretary shall as a non-voting member of the Executive Committee of the Council, together with the Council Chairperson and the Vice Chairperson, handle emergency business arising between the Council meetings, subject to approval of the Council at its next meeting. The MDC Secretary shall be an ex-officio member of Council and of all MDC Committees.

Attend, when requested by and compensated by the Council, the Lions Clubs International Convention and maintain an MDC office at said convention. Reasonable daily office hours shall be maintained, and a daily newsletter shall be published and distributed to all attendees for the duration of the convention.

The office shall assist any political campaigns and all attendees in order that their convention experience be maximized.

Fellow Lions:

Please let me introduce myself. My name is Mike Janssen and I am a Past District Governor in 5M11 a district in MD5M. I am located in the heart of Canada. My district is an international district with clubs on both sides of the U.S. Canada boarder. After 3 years of attempting to establish a cancer program within my district in 2014 with the blessing of our District Governor I started a Lions CancerCare Initiative in our District. I sat as chair of the Initiative for all of its years of operation until November of 2019. During those years the Initiative supported many endeavors including supporting individuals dealing with cancer, providing a portable infusion pump to a children's cancer clinic and providing a WIFI system and tablets to the blood borne cancer ward at the Health Sciences Center in Winnipeg, get me started and I will pull at your heart strings with that one. I would also go out and present at all of the clubs in our district as well as at conventions. I held several events to raise awareness and funds including head shaves, raffles and more.

Fast forward to 2019. After Lions International introduced it support of pediatric cancer, I began petitioning the MD5M council of Governors to allow a childhood cancer program in the multiple, offering myself as its first chair. After much presenting and lobbying and debate by the Council of Governors, this was achieved. Then the work began to garner district chairs from all twelve of our districts. This was quite a task but it did happen. Not being satisfied I felt that a foundation was needed and with the help of one of the chairs we began the process of petitioning to be come in fact 2 foundations, one in Minnesota which is known as The Minnesota Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation and the one in Canada being called The Canadian Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation. This name was strategically chosen because we knew we wanted to grow this across the country. Our district chairs in 5M10, 5M11, and 5M13 went on to become directors. I myself sat on both foundations for 2 years until finding another person to take my place on the Minnesota foundation, allowing me to concentrate on the Canadian foundation. However, I do remain as a liaison between both foundations.

As alluded to, we did name our newest foundation The CANADIAN Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation so it could grow across our great country, and that time has come. In November of 2019 we became incorporated with the Federal Government. Since then, we managed to raise in excess of \$40,000.00, presented at clubs and conventions, held several fundraisers, club inclusive projects, and financially supported children and their families dealing with cancer. We plan to continue supporting families and survivors as our main focus. We also plan to help childhood cancer centers as we can and spread Childhood Cancer awareness. Our plan is to work in unison with the LCIF Childhood Cancer program. We are embarking on our next project Mighty Meagan's Zipper Shirts for Children undergoing chemo, a very worthwhile project. As one nurse had said this is a real game changer in administering chemo.

I hope I've piqued your interest because much like the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides did in the early 1980's, It is Time to spread our wings and fly. It's time to grow our Childhood Cancer family across the country. We will be planning to hold a Zoom meeting in the near future and look forward to seeing you there.
