#### FROM NAMI TO GMA

In the last year most of us were introduced to the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI). This acronym belongs to another organization and since Lions Clubs International desired to take this effort world-wide it became Global Membership Approach (GMA). While our District had signed on at the start of last year, I was unable to help introduce the program during the last year. Also like most everyone, I had little idea how the initiative worked. However, while convalescing over the winter I gained some insight and knowledge on the GMA.

Zone Chair Barb Riley and the clubs of 7 served as one of the North America Pilot Zones. Like the vast majority of the pilot zones, zone 7 had an overall membership increase last year. This is with some of the clubs not participating. Three of the 6 clubs in this zone will qualify for the Club Excellence Award which is based on more than membership increases. While increasing Membership is a desired goal, the GMI seeks to do more than that for our clubs.

GMA Seeks to revitalize the clubs not only with new members, but increased fellowship within the clubs, undertaking new service projects and by taking advantage of some of the numerous learning opportunities available through LCI our Multiple District and our District Learning Chairs. In general we are seeking to make our clubs stronger.

As we come out of the Covid Pandemic there is no better time to rediscover who we are and to start building towards a brighter future. We have almost 100 clubs in our District, so it will be difficult to get everyone going at the same time. I also realize that not all Clubs will seek to take the GMA on at this time. It is my goal to try to aid as many Clubs and Zones as possible over the course of the next year. Hopefully some Zone Chairs will take advantage of this opportunity to help build up the Clubs in their Zone. And as I said I hope to aid Clubs without Zone Chairs.

Throughout our District, our Multiple District and North America (as well as other parts of the world) Clubs face similar obstacles.

- · Same Club Officers year after year
- Unable to attract New and Younger Member
- And the list goes on.

Hopefully we will be able to deal with some of these issues in the this year.

I am also the District Membership Chair and as such will work with clubs that don't feel comfortable undertaking the Global Membership Approach. 
