Changing The World!

I'm so happy to report that our District has received an LCIF Grant for Ukrainian Refugee English Language Support. In partnership with District C-1 Lions and St. Albert Newcomers Centre, the grant will be used to furnish and equip a second teaching room for instructors and adult learners to use for English as a Second Language instruction. This will help these professionals learn English to help acquire employment or upgrade their education. St. Albert has close to 500 Ukrainian families settle in the city and surrounding area so the need was great. Such a great example of working together to do what's right. The District will also be working with other communities that have high numbers of Ukrainian refugees to see if additional help is needed or can be offered.

As you've heard already, but just a reminder, the new Lion Portal will be launching in the near future. This will be the new reporting system for MyLCI and MyLion. Powered by Salesforce, this will be a much more user friendly reporting system where everything is linked together and easier to navigate. It will make reporting your Clubs Service activities and volunteer hours sooooo much easier. Watch for more information on the LCI webpage or at upcoming training opportunities.

With school about to start for another year, this is a great time to promote the Lions Peace Poster contest to your local schools or youth groups. The International Association of Lions Clubs Constitution and By-Laws

Following the close of the Lions Clubs International Convention and International Board of Directors Meeting in Boston, Massachusetts, USA, the following updates took effect.

Standard Club Constitution and Bylaws – Revised July 11, 2023

By-Laws Article I – Membership Section 1.

(h) Discounted Member: A member of this club who pays discounted dues as a result of their family membership status, student status or participation in any other discounted membership program offered by the association who desires to retain membership in this club and meets the qualifications for discounted dues. The membership status shall be verified by the board of directors of this club. A Discounted Member shall be eligible to hold office in district or international meetings, but shall pay such dues as the local club may charge, which dues shall include district and international dues. This membership category shall not be included in the club delegate formula calculation. [Above section effective January 1, 2024]

International Constitution and Bylaws – Revised July 11, 2023

This is in effect for all Lions Clubs

Article XII – Fees and Dues Section 2. Membership Dues

(a) Semi-annual membership dues of twenty-three dollars (US\$23.00) denominated in U.S. dollars shall be levied on each club member based upon the membership of each club as shown by its membership report of June and December and shall be paid by each club to the international office as shall be determined by the International Board of Directors, except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) herein. [Above section effective July 1, 2023]

- (a) Semi-annual membership dues of twenty-four dollars (US\$24.00) denominated in U.S. dollars shall be levied on each club member based upon the membership of each club as shown by its membership report of June and December and shall be paid by each club to the international office as shall be determined by the International Board of Directors, except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) herein. [Above section effective July 1, 2024]
- (a) Semi-annual membership dues of twenty-five dollars (US\$25.00) denominated in U.S. dollars shall be levied on each club member based upon the membership of each club as shown by its membership report of June and December and shall be paid by each club to the international office as shall be determined by the International Board of Directors, except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) herein. [Above section effective July 1, 2025]

Standard District Constitution and Bylaws – Revised July 11, 2023

Constitution; Article VI – Officers and District Cabinet

Section 2. District Cabinet

Revised.... District Global Action Team members and LCIF district coordinator may be voting members of district cabinet.

By-Laws; Article III – Duties of District Officers/Cabinet

Revised... Section 1. District Governor; Section 2. First Vice District Governor; Section 3. Second Vice District Governor; Section 5. GST District Coordinator; Section 6. GMT District Coordinator; Section 7. GLT District Coordinator; Section 10 LCIF District Coordinator; Section 13. Zone Chairperson

District C-1 Constitution and By-Laws state:
Amendments: Section 2. AUTOMATIC UPDATE. When amendments to the International Constitution and By-Laws are passed at the International Convention, any amendments that would have an effect on this District Constitution and By-Laws shall automatically be updated in this district constitution and by-laws at the close of the convention.
