

Her involvement within diabetes organizations has ranged from board member, chair of outreach to mentorship for newly diagnosed families and community walks.

After many years in the banking industry, Melanie made the transition to put her efforts fully into the diabetes community.



Dr. Edsel Ing, Chief of Ophthalmology Edmonton Zone. Professor & Chair UoA DOVS, Faculty of Medicine & Dentistry - Department of Ophthalmology & Visual Science

Dr. Ing sees patients who require eyelid plastic & reconstructive surgery (Oculoplastics), orbit surgery, and eye muscle realignment surgery (Strabismus). He is also a surgical Neuro-ophthalmologist. He hopes to provide some "wisdom" and shed "light" (sapientia et lux) on your ophthalmic problem. His office is located at the Eye Institute of Alberta.

Dr. Ing has more than 155 published works and has delivered hundreds of lectures. He has been a visiting speaker at the University of British Columbia, University of Manitoba, McMaster University, Western University and Dalhousie University.

REDWATER LIONS CLUB




On December 1st and 2nd the Lions

On July 17, 1983, Tammy dove into a pool and broker her neck. In 2011, after 28 years of pushing herself around in her wheelchair, her shoulders and back were giving her trouble. If she dropped something she had trouble bending down and then getting back up. Opening a door was difficult and painful. A friend told her about Dog Guides. That's when Kiwi came into her life. Tammy immediately felt that their partnership was meant to be... Kiwi's birthday is July 17th... the date of her accident.

À can't imagine my life without Kiwi. She helps me pick things up or get things I can't reach. She's a great companion. Every Alay with my

disability is a new challenge. But with Kiwi, she takes that challenge away. Ashe makes me feel safer. When I'm sick, she alerts my neighbours. When my chair got stuck on ice, she saved me from freezing to death by alerting a passerby. She has brought back my independence that I was losing. I'd be lost without her. A

Leo Clubs have come a long way since 1957, when the first club was organized at a Pennsylvania, USA high school. Established solely as an activity of the Glenside Lions Club, the total membership of the Abington High School Leo Club was the school baseball team.

In 1967, the International Association of Lions Clubs board of directors adopted Leo Clubs as an official worldwide program. "to provide the youth of the world an opportunity for development and contribution, individually and collectively, as responsible members of the local, national, and international community"

Since then, Leo Clubs have flourished. They are now present in over 150+ countries and have estimated membership of 160,000+ in 7400+ clubs worldwide.

What are Leo Clubs,

- Leo Clubs are groups of young people, worldwide who provide hundreds of valuable humanitarian services for their community and around the world.

 Leos reflect the proud **We Serve** spirit of Lions Club International. Each Leo Club functions as an activity of a Lions Club.
- ➤ A Leo Club has an Advisor who is a member of the sponsoring Lions Club. The Advisor encourages and guides the Leos, and acts as a liaison between the Leo Club and the Lions Club.
- ➤ Leo Club membership is open to young people between the ages of 12 and 28.

 Membership is divided into two classifications: Alpha (ages 12-17) and omega (ages 18-28). A club may include either or both age classifications, depending on local preferences.
- > Leo Club activities include regular meetings, service projects and social functions.

The Leo Motto - Leadership, Experience, Opportunity - is fulfilled as members work together in response to the need of others.


